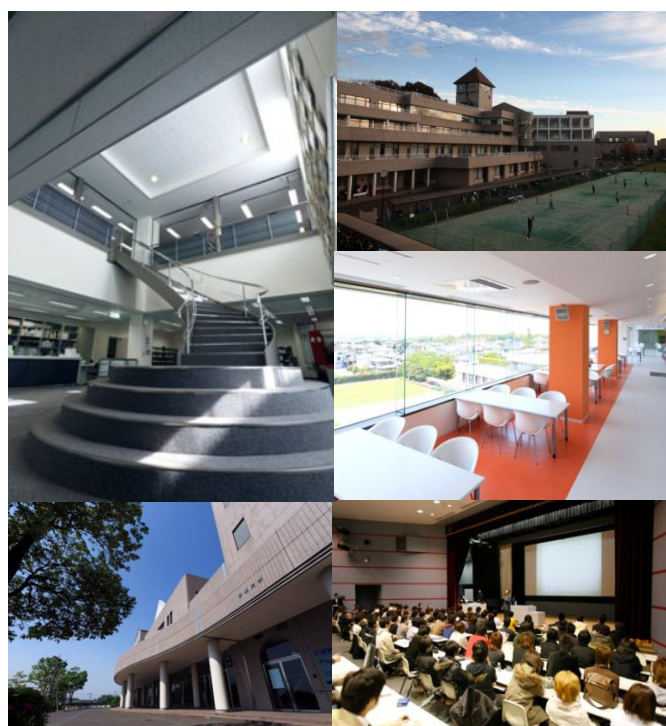
Characteristics

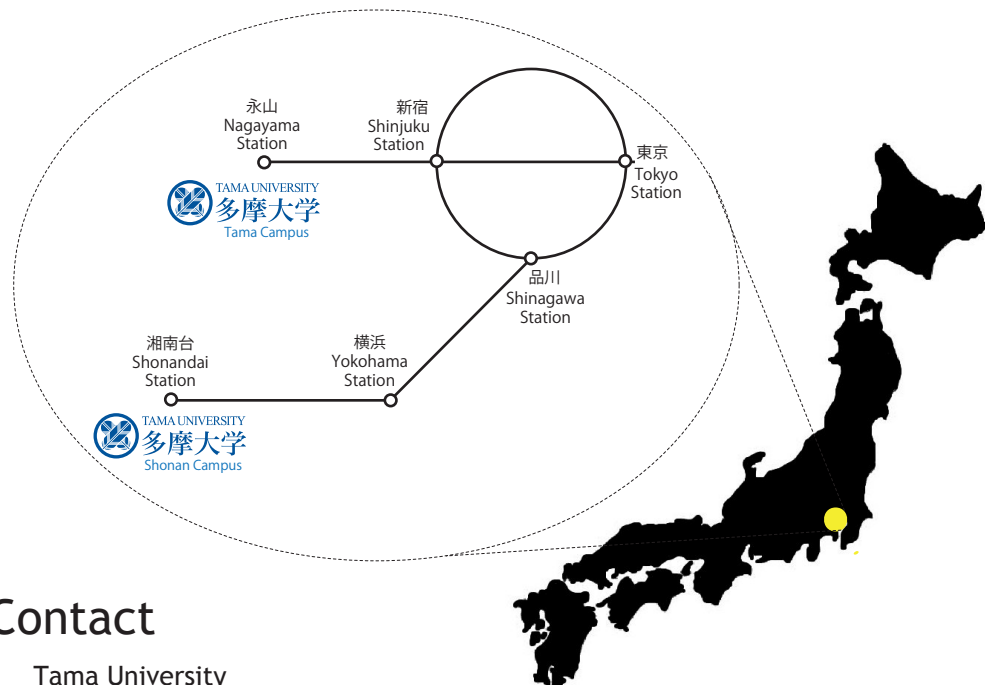
